

Rough sleeping in England

An analysis of 2014 rough sleeping counts and estimates data


On 26 February, 2015 the Department for Communities and Local Government released the autumn 2014 figures for rough sleeping. These statistics provide a snapshot figure of the number of people every local authority estimates or counts to be sleeping rough on any one night. The following analysis provides a regional breakdown and identifies the local authority areas that have seen the largest increases when compared with previous years.

Headline figures

2,744 people were counted or estimated by local authorities to be sleeping rough on any one night in the 2014 count. This was up from **2,414** in 2013, **2,309** in 2012, **2,181** in 2011 and **1,768** in 2010.

Rough sleeping by region

Six regions reported an increase in the numbers of people rough sleeping compared to 2013; London (199), South East England (77), South West England (54), North West England (37), North East England (10) and East England (6), (Graph 1).

Rough sleeping by local authority

The ten local authorities with the highest rates of rough sleeping can be seen in Table 2. The top three local authorities are all based in London.

Other local authorities that saw large increases in the number of people rough sleeping were Hounslow (15), Bournemouth (15). West Berkshire (15) and Torbay (12).

Other local authorities that saw large percentage increases in the number of people rough sleeping were Greenwich (1500%), North Somerset (600%), Runnymede (550%) and Ashford (400%). Please note, large percentage increases may reflect the fact that 2013 figures were low.
